

On the special occasion of Harding Shinn's 100th birthday (March 5), Charlotte Dilworth South End Rotary Club extends its VERY BEST WISHES and HEARTIEST CONGRATULATIONS to Harding. Harding is a VERY special member of Dilworth South End Rotary since he joined Rotary International in 1964. Harding was sponsored into Rotary by Member Jack Fullbright and holds the Classification of "Water Treatment Engineer."

Harding has served Rotary in so many ways through his almost six decades of Rotary membership! In 1973-74, Harding was our President. Throughout his membership, Harding has served on many club committees, special club projects, and in community service.

Harding is a *strong* supporter of the Rotary International Foundation through his many years of consistent Foundation support. The Rotary International Foundation has recognized Harding as a *Multiple Paul Harris Fellow, Major Donor* (Level Three) to the Foundation, and as a *Rotary Foundation Benefactor*. Our club has also recognized his exemplary leadership and his many years of dedicated service to the club and the Charlotte community with the club's highest honor of "*Distinguished Rotarian*" in 2001. Of further and significant note, Harding has achieved 50 (yes, "Fifty") years of **Perfect Attendance** at our weekly club meetings!

Harding is a native of Cabarrus County and grew up on a farm. Harding notes that while growing up on his family farm, it was a farm "with no running water and no electricity." After high school, Harding proudly served our country during World War II. During WWII, Harding was an Instructor for new pilots in the United States Army Air Corps (later the United States Air Force) with many of his "students" serving in the European "Theater" of the war.

After his service during WWII in the Army Air Corps, via the G.I. Bill, Harding enrolled in North Carolina State University (NC State) and graduated in 1951, earning a Bachelor of Science Degree in Mechanical Engineering. As a young engineer, Harding worked/lived in Richmond, VA (twice) and Atlanta, GA, before returning to Charlotte in 1954.

In 1950, Harding married "Maxene" and they have three children, two sons and a daughter. Maxene passed away a few years ago.

Harding has many favorite memories and experiences in Rotary! Harding notes that during his year as president, one of our more memorable club programs was the Friday when John Paul Stevens spoke to our club and also our Rotary District Conference held in Charlotte in 1974. John Paul Stevens would later become a United States Supreme Court Justice serving from 1975 to 2010. Also, since the Rotary district conference was in Charlotte that year, Dilworth Rotary had important roles in that conference.

Harding has also attended a number of Rotary International Conventions and recalls fondly his experiences and travels to Australia for the 1971 International Convention in Sydney and other conventions, district conferences, and Rotary meetings over the years. Via his attendance and regular participation on Rotary (at every level), he found his most enjoyable part of Rotary is "Rotary Fellowship"!

When asked why he joined Rotary, Harding states that he'd "heard a lot about it" and had "heard many good things about Rotary." He adds, "I also knew that there were a lot of good and honest people there and people that I needed to meet."

Addressing newer Rotarians and prospective Rotarians, Harding says "Get involved!" Harding also notes that Rotary does a very good job of having its older members look after its younger members".

Harding has so wonderfully and selflessly exemplified his message of "Getting Involved" and staying involved in Rotary over his (now) almost six decades of Rotary Membership!

Charlotte Dilworth South End Rotary Club is exceedingly proud to have Harding Shinn as a member and wishes him a VERY HAPPY 100th BIRTHDAY (and many MORE birthdays) as he continues his *"Service Above Self"* in Rotary and throughout his life!



Celebrating the 100th Birthday of Harding Shinn

Saturday, March 5, 1921 Greatest Generation, Chinese Zodiac: Rooster, Star Sigh: Pisces

What Happened on this date

- The Durban Land Alienation Ordinance passes, enabling the Durban City Council to exclude Indians from ownership or occupation of property in white areas of South Africa.
- The US warns Costa Rica and Panama to settle disputes peacefully.

Famous Birthdays

- Berkley Bedell (Rep-D-IA, 1975-1987)(d 2019)
- Elmer Valo, American baseball player (d 1998)
- Harding Shinn, famous Rotarian, member since 1964

Historical Events in 1921

- The Irish Free State is created as Southern Ireland
- US Emergency Quota Act is passed (May 19): limited the number of immigrants that were allowed to come to the US.
- US Tulsa Race Riot (May 31—June 1)
- Tomb of the Unknown Soldier (March 4): The US Congress approves
 the burial of an unidentified soldier from WWI at the tomb, which
 reads: "Here rests in honored glory an American Soldier known but to
 God."
- US Sheppard-Towner Maternity and Infancy Act becomes law on November 23, marking one of the first times the US ventured into social security.
- The first Rotary club in Africa was chartered in Johannesburg, South Africa, in 1921.
- Poland Treaty of Riga—USSR and Poland agreed to the Treaty of Riga which established a permanent border between the two countries.
- Soviet-Georgian War Begins in December as the Soviet Union invades the Democratic Republic of Georgia.
- The US and Germany sign the Treaty of Berlin in August ending WWI for the US.
- Babe Ruth Hits his 138th home run in June breaking the career home run record held by Roger Connor for 23 years.
- The Great Famine of 1921 in Russia was different from many famines as there were a number of contributing circumstances surrounding the tragic event.
- Adolph Hitler becomes Chairman of the Nazi Party in his rise to power and prominence in Germany.
- Franklin D Roosevelt at 39 years old, contracts Polio.
- Ellis Island is placed under quarantine on May 18 due to Typhus outbreak.
- Sleeping Sickness claims nearly 1,000 lives in the US.
- Coco Chanel introduces Chanel No. 5
- The Communist Party of China is formed with Mao Tse-tung (Zedong) as a founding member.
- Trial involving the Chicago Black Sox team accused of throwing the World Series begins.
- Iowa becomes the first state to impose a cigarette tax on April 11.
- Ku Klux Klan activities become violent throughout the Southern US.

Harding's presumed namesake, Warren G Harding, President of the United States, was also a Rotarian!




7680 District Conference & RLI April 23, 24, 2021
